High Sheriff of Hertfordshire gives award to Gratitude

On 8 July 2020 the High Sheriff of Hertfordshire, The Honourable Thurston Holland-Hibbert, visited Allum Manor to present an award to local charity Gratitude.

Gratitude, based in Borehamwood, fight hunger and food waste. They take food that's good to eat but can't be sold in shops because of packaging errors or overproduction. They then redistribute it to the community through various free meals projects, a community pantry and a network of local charities.

Allum Manor manager Tony Battison said "We closed our doors on 17 March because of the coronavirus pandemic and it seemed such a waste that our lovely large hall was not being used. We were approached by Gratitude, who needed a temporary venue to carry out their operation at no charge, and we were only too pleased to help".

Gratitude have been at Allum Manor since early April, operating every afternoon from Monday to Friday. By the time of the High Sheriff's visit they had served 3,100 local Borehamwood residents and handed out an estimated £186,000 worth of food. An estimated 124 tons of food has been saved from going into landfill. Gratitude also deliver to shelters and other charities. The whole Gratitude programme is staffed by volunteers and an estimated 1560 hours has been put in at Allum Manor with many more hours behind the scenes.



Since 22 July local Borehamwood children have also been receiving nutritious meals on a "meals on wheels for schoolchildren" scheme. Gratitude use the car park at Allum Manor to transfer cooked meals from vans to volunteers' cars for delivery.

John Carlisle, CEO of Gratitude said "The whole Gratitude programme at Allum Manor has been an astonishing success. Not least because of the management and staff being very helpful, and in particular the amazing contribution of Michael, the caretaker".

Allum Manor has also hosted four Blood Donor clinics since the lockdown started, with two more planned for September and December. Manager Tony Battison said "We have given the NHS our hall "free-to-use" for these clinics. The NHS has been brilliant during the pandemic and we felt this was a practical way we could support it".

Allum Manor has carried out a Covid-19 risk assessment to ensure that it is 'Covid-19 secure'. Slowly but surely customers are starting to return, while observing social distancing requirements.

Thank you Borehamwood!

Well, what an unusual and busy last six months the Borehamwood Foodbank has had! Thank you for all of your amazing support since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic in March.

We are very proud that we were able to stay open while most agencies around us closed their doors. Demand for our support has soared but so too have our donations. From April to June 2020 we fed 2,107 people, compared to the same period in 2019 where we fed 688 people. We gratefully took in 21.4 tonnes of food, compared to seven tonnes the previous year. We're amazed by your generosity and cannot thank you enough! We've also taken in regular weekly donations from local businesses including Morrisons, Tesco and Sainsburys. Our community is simply amazing!

Here is some feedback on what your generosity has meant

"Thank you for the food pack we received today, your help has been the difference between me being able to feed my family or gas and electric, so we all thank you from the bottom of our hearts. We have finally heard from Universal Credit and will receive our first payment on the 4 June which is ten weeks after we received any wages! It has been very difficult trying to pay the bills, your generous donation has been our lifeline, please pass on our thanks to all of your volunteers, without you we wouldn't have coped".



We've had a busy summer supporting families with lots of cookery and craft packs to take home. Our first two summer sessions alone we gave food packs to 117 children! Some of their cookery efforts are below. We've also provided financial support in the form of grants for gas and electricity, as well as support to purchase school



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uniforms ready for September. Over a two week period we purchased school uniforms for over 50 children!!

Saffron Green Primary School

Early Years at Saffron Green Primary School - Pre and Post Covid

At Saffron Green Primary School our Early Years and Foundation Stage Unit has always been a thriving part of our school. Our outdoor area was recently refurbished to further enhance our provision of the "Seven Areas of Learning" within the foundation stage, alongside providing a multi-sensory approach to support those pupils with special educational needs. Our colourful and vibrant indoor area mirrors this provision and strongly supports the "Characteristics of Effective Learning" *. At Saffron Green we embrace the children's interests, allowing this to inform and enhance our continuous provision throughout the academic year, and allowing the children to take ownership of their learning by creating these areas with the staff.

Prior to lockdown, the children enjoyed learning about traditional tales and re-enacting them with puppets and masks. They even made their own beanstalk to climb. In addition to this they planted seeds in the garden to watch and learn all about "The Plant Cycle" and how the plant changes and develops over time. Working with this topic-based

style of learning is a key strength of the Early Years Provision at Saffron Green in both our nursery and reception class. We are very pleased to announce that this year we are able to offer 30 hours of provision to our nursery children.

In September 2020, despite Covid, we still aim to provide multisensory learning opportunities to suit each individual pupil's needs and interests. We will continue to hold our stay-and-play sessions where the parents can help their child settle into their new environment and routines, but this will now be held in our spacious and inviting outdoor areas. We are extremely excited at the thought of welcoming all of your children back to school in September.

We are not in Kansas anymore Toto!

When she awoke, Dorothy was amazed to find herself zoomed up in a tornado and not back home in Kansas. I wonder if she would recognise what is happening today.

Everything has changed and what has happened to schools throughout the world is unique. Even during the second world war children still went to school.

One thing we do know as school governors is how hard the staff have been working to ensure children could get back in, while protecting staff from getting ill themselves. Unlike Dorothy and her pals, social distancing has been a big challenge for schools and this has meant lots of moving furniture around, setting up signs so that everyone is able to move around safely.

Governors have had to adapt too, as we have still had responsibility for setting and agreeing the strategic direction of the school. For the schools that I am involved with, everyone has got to grips with using Zoom or an alternative known as Microsoft Teams. Attendance at these virtual meetings has been better than normal. There has been the additional advantage of being able to quickly phone anyone missing to see if they are OK, and often they then are able to quickly join in.

Careful chairing has been more important than normal to ensure that everyone can contribute. When we have had lots of participants, governors have had to turn off their video to ensure that everyone can join. Too many people joining means that it eats up the internet bandwidth and either does not work or is very slow. We have all been learning new skills like muting our own output so that, interesting as it might be, everyone does not pick up on the business of what is going on in our homes.

Whether it be by gifts to occupy long hospital stays, entertainment in hospital, memory making days out, breaks away and so on - anything that may bring some happiness and help at such a life shattering time.


How we achieve our aims:

We don't want anyone ever to forget Luke, he was far too special for that. We want him to live in the minds of all that knew him forever, and for people to live the dreams that he can't. We aim to achieve this with special 'Luke footprint stones'. Small palm-size stones, which have Luke's footprint printed on one side, and a rainbow that he painted during treatment printed on the other. These stones are available, for a small voluntary donation, to anyone who knew Luke, anyone who wishes they knew him, anyone who wants to get involved and support us in keeping our beautiful boy's memory alive. Going on holiday? Have an exciting day out planned? We are asking people to take a stone

with them, to think of Luke at their destination, include him in their new memory, then to leave the stone behind – taking a photo of where it has been left. We would love you to send this photo to us, so we can pin it on our world map, which we share on our website and Facebook page for all to see. Our hope is for Luke's dreams to be lived by others, for his footprints to cover the world, for him to live with us all forever.

All donations the charity receives, from the footprint stones or otherwise, will go towards supporting children diagnosed with childhood cancer living in Borehamwood or the boroughs of Barnet and Enfield. When a child is diagnosed with cancer in North London, they will primarily be treated at a specialist oncology hospital, such as Great Ormond Street and UCLH, but they will also be seen and cared for by the Paediatric Oncology Shared Care Unit at their local 'shared care' hospital. To begin with, we will be offering support to the oncology children who are receiving treatment at one of the above primary hospitals and who are under 'shared care' with Barnet Hospital. As the charity grows, we hope to be able to open up and offer our support to the oncology children under the care of North Middlesex Hospital too.

Tony McHale



Borehamwood Brass 2020

Since lockdown on 23 March the band has been keeping in touch via a conferencing session once a week, whilst also setting up a 'What's App' group for everyone to keep in contact.

The conferencing sessions have in recent weeks included talks from members about their playing careers. Some sessions have also included a mini 'pub quiz'. A session on 26 June welcomed Malcolm Rice. As many may know, Malcolm's family started Borehamwood Brass back in 1971. Malcolm joined the group from his home in Cornwall.

During lockdown, the band was approached by a reporter from Borehamwood's German twin town, Offenburg, asking if we could write an article about how lockdown has affected music and culture in England. This article was published in early April in their Offenblatt local community magazine, run by the Offenburg Stadt.

For the foreseeable future the band has suspended all rehearsals to comply with all the restrictions that are in place, but we are reviewing this at regular intervals.

The band are keeping a close eye on the government restrictions for music groups, re-commencing rehearsals when all relevant measures required are in place and social distancing rules permit the group to

meet again. The band will follow advice from Public Health England and Brass Band England, an advisory body offering training and support for member bands throughout the UK.

Elstree Mozart Players

Elstree Mozart Players were founded by Derek Holland, currently the Musical Director of Borehamwood Brass, first appearing at festival concerts with the band as long ago as 1993.

The local community supported this idea, championed by Cllr. Pat Strack and Andrew Grady. Others including Revd. Tim Warr from All Saints Church and the Town Council Entertainments Committee made this venture a success.

The orchestra is drawn from a group of specially chosen semi-professional and professional musicians from the local area, with the aim of performing, for the local community to enjoy and engage, a wide range of orchestral and choral music.



Given the extent of the coronavirus (Covid-19) outbreak across the world, and the government ceasing all gatherings and closure of theatres and bars, all events planned have been cancelled for rescheduling at a later date

The orchestra hopes to be able to hold an event for the NSPCC in October and their concert on Sunday 1 November 2020, but a decision about this will be taken in September. This will very much depend on whether government restrictions are still in place allowing for musical events and concerts to take place.

Meadow Park covered entertainment arena

On Tuesday 3 June 2020, the process of providing a permanent 'covered entertainment arena' in Meadow Park took one step further, with Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council agreeing to provide funding for the structure, to be sited in Meadow Park with the agreement of Hertsmere Borough Council.

Project committee members and Rotarians from the two clubs in the town, Andrew Grady and Norman Shuker, gave two short presentations about the benefits such a facility can provide, demonstrating that a vast amount of research and planning had been undertaken by the project committee.


This structure can and will be an asset to the local community, being able to be used for different aspects of life within the town.

The setting up of a series of concerts to provide 'proof of concept' working with the London & Home Counties Brass Band Association and local community performers has been particularly welcomed by many in the community.

Given the extent of the coronavirus (Covid-19) outbreak, and the government ceasing all gatherings and closure of all planned current events in the UK, the committee had to cancel its plans to hold the summer concert series in June and July this year.

It is hoped, if things improve, that four shortened concerts will take place during October so that the townsfolk can enjoy these popular Sunday afternoon concerts in Meadow Park.

The project committee also consists of Nick Male, local musician, and Town Cllr Pat Strack, both of whom are Rotarians.



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Hollywood in Hertfordshire

(MGM British Studios)

'If ever there was a 'Rolls Royce' of British film studios, it was MGM British, which stood on 115 acres off Elstree Way from 1936 until 1970, where it produced world-famous films, attracting many of Hollywood's most legendary stars.'

These words in the summer edition of Town Crier announced plans to launch a new book by local film historian Paul Welsh to tell the remarkable story of this iconic film and TV studio.

Then came the Covid-19 pandemic and national lockdown. But by early May, 300 copies had arrived from the printer. A planned display in the reception area of 96 Shenley Road and a book signing were no longer permitted, and so started a campaign to launch 'MGM British Studios'.


Posts were made on key local Facebook pages, the Facebook pages of national groups of fans of the MGM Studios and of the films and television series made there, and also Hertfordshire's '2020 Year of Culture' Facebook page. The book appeared on the covers of 'Hertfordshire Life' and of 'The Veteran', a quarterly magazine for British film and TV veterans. The British History Project and the Cinema Museum also publicised the online launch.



In each case, people were invited to visit the website of Elstree Screen Heritage (ESH) to discover more about the book and how they could buy their copy.

Described as the perfect antidote to 'lockdown blues', the book quickly started to sell as word spread. By the end of July, over 375 copies had been posted out by Elstree Screen Heritage. Another 200-plus copies were bought by viewers of Talking Pictures TV..

Why has a book about a UK film and TV studio which closed 50 years ago proved such a success? In part because groups of dedicated film and TV fans are eager for new details about such studios.



The book was designed partly to appeal to them, containing new 'inside stories' as well as over 400 photos and drawings, most of them never before published. Fans from across the world, as far away as Australia and New Zealand, have bought copies.


But just as many copies now sit in the homes of local residents, curious about tales of MGM's own British studio. In some cases their relatives had worked in the studio, while for others the book was an ideal Father's Day gift. But often these Borehamwood locals simply wanted to read a story about the town in which they live. 
Teddy's Trails are now available in print ...




Here are the four shortlisted designs

Green and yellow represent the local fields and woods. The tree represents wildlife as well as the names of Elstree and Borehamwood. Elstree comes from the name of Tidwulf's tree. The crown is the Anglo-Saxon crown of Mercia.

B



Black and white are the colours of Boreham Wood Football club. The clapper board represents the movies filmed at the studios in Borehamwood. The blue is from the Hertsmere council logo.

C



The outline represents the boundary of Elstree and Borehamwood parish. The film strip and camera reflect the town's film-making history. Black and white are the colours of Boreham Wood Football Club.

D



Elstree Rural District Council's arms featured a spool of film, which the flag echoes. Black and white mirror the colours of Boreham Wood Football Club. The blue is the same shade used in the flag of Hertfordshire.

Compost Corner

Love salad?... and cupboard love

Many people at home, or on their allotments plant radishes “because they’re easy”. Also lettuce, tomatoes and cucumbers.

Last week I dug up some early potatoes which had suffered a touch of blight. The potatoes were small but unblemished. These paired up very nicely with the last of the broad beans. Both were steamed, the potato skins peeled off easily, and the little emerald beans were popped out of their skins.

Added to these were lots of chopped chives, fresh dill and fennel fronds, and mint. I had some asparagus (which I steamed) and half a tin of red kidney beans in the fridge which went in for good luck.

The dressing was a mixture of lemon juice, olive oil, Dijon mustard, whole grain mustard, salt, and bit of honey – quantities to taste. Edible calendula petals were sprinkled on top to add a touch of pizazz.

What was missing was some crumbled Roquefort, according to my husband. On the side was a bowl of skinless/boneless sardines in olive oil. I wondered if sardines and Roquefort went together? Surprisingly, when I Googled this, several French recipes came up with a tasty dip called rillettes de sardines au Roquefort to accompany bread or toast.

Not one to waste anything, both sets of skins (remember?) were left to dry as we ate our lunch outside. With a little olive oil and salt (plus garlic powder and curry powder with broad bean skins), these were put in a low oven to make potato skin crisps, and a crispy/chewy snack to go with a glass of chilled Villa Maria!

Follow up lunch with a stroll around Aberford Park to see the nesting coots.

No need to book that flight, eh?

Hatzola Herts

It is quite common for NHS ambulance and first responder services to be supplemented by a community first responder service such as St John's Ambulance.



Over the past few years an organisation called Hatzola (the Hebrew word for rescue) has created a number of community first responder services in areas with a large Jewish populations, with the purpose of complementing the NHS first responder and rescue services in those areas, so as to fulfil the Jewish principle of Pikuach Nefesh, saving lives.

The services of Hatzola are open to the whole community. Its infrastructure, training and services are all run by volunteers, and are funded entirely by donations.

For the past two and a half years, we have been developing the infrastructure of Hatzola Herts which will initially cover Borehamwood and Elstree, but we hope to soon extend our services to Radlett, Shenley and Aldenham. Our team members are currently going through a vigorous training programme, and will hopefully be ready to "go live" later in the year.

We are also hoping to have our own fully equipped ambulance which will be able to provide a full CPR and life support service should the need arise.

A most important constituent part of our training and development is our relationship with the East of England Ambulance Service (EoEAS), whose involvement with our development has been integral and critical. Our trained first responders will shortly be licenced to accompany EoEAS paramedics to their emergency callouts to sharpen up on their practical training, and indeed once we "go live", they will also be licenced to attend emergency call-outs if NHS resources are stretched.

Taylor Wimpey threat to deregister part of Woodcock Hill Village Green

On 15 June, Taylor Wimpey notified the WHVG Committee that they would submit a proposal to the Secretary of State to deregister part of the Village Green bounded by Vale Avenue, Byron Avenue and Onona - owned Village Green at the top of the hill.

On 17 June leaflets were circulated to 500 homes adjacent to the Village Green by Pegasus, a company acting for Taylor Wimpey. The leaflets asked for responses from residents to their proposals to exchange land over the railway and into a field to the north of Barnet Lane. The consultation sought responses by 17 July, later extended to 24 July. Bad news can be buried during a pandemic.

Further to charm residents, Taylor Wimpey suggested that the new village green would be more accessible, have an outdoor gym, a woodland trail and picnic tables which would greatly benefit residents. What they omitted to say was that they proposed to build on the released land. Mature trees, with tree preservation orders, would have to be felled to make way for a path to connect the released land to the exchange land. That is a 1 in 4 steep path that would allow access to residents from Poets Rise, Byron Avenue, Fire Research estate and Melrose, Vale Avenues, Tennyson and Milton Drive. Taylor Wimpey had asked for Hertsmere Borough Council to consider 110 homes being built there as part of the call for sites from developers and speculators for the Hertsmere Local Plan. This would add to the air and noise pollution and traffic. The already overstretched local infrastructure would have to bear extra 400 residents and 200+ cars.

Allegations were made by Taylor Wimpey that the Village Green was not well maintained and they could manage it better. Completely untrue. Management plan was set up by Herts Countryside Management Services in 2008 and Alex Melson, our project manager, has updated the plan over the last five years. WHVG has wild life



conservation status and tree preservation orders on all the trees. The land is managed in accordance with the WHVG constitution to strike a balance between human users for lawful recreation and promoting habitats for flora and fauna. The slopes are kept clear for tobogganing. Three ponds have been added to add a water habitat and plant diversity.

Taylor Wimpey wants to change the nature of the Village Green to a rural park. Parks we have aplenty but this is the only nature reserve in the town.


As well as residents, environmental groups have objected to the deregistration: Herts & Middlesex Wild Life Trust, the Open Spaces Society, Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society, Friends of the Earth, Natural England. Statutory bodies have objected: Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council, Hertsmere Borough Council Planning Department, Hillside borough councillors Victor Eni, Meenal Sachdev and Farida Turner, town ward borough councillors Morris Bright, Harvey Cohen, Susan Brown, Glenn Briski, Brett Rosehill and Alan Plancey.

WHVG committee was pleased to welcome Oliver Dowden MP on a site visit to discuss the issues at the Village Green. He had visited many times before and has planted trees and joined working parties over the years as our MP. He issued a press statement objecting to deregistration.

Taylor Wimpey will move to the next stage and submit their application to the Planning inspectorate in August. PINS will start a statutory consultation (28 days). Further representations will be made by environmental groups, statutory bodies and others.

Woodcock Hill Village Green are taking legal advice and will build a strong case to prevent the Village Green being deregistered.





Report from Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society on our activities to July 2020

The difficult problem of reconciling housing needs with preservation of our beautiful Hertfordshire countryside continues to dominate our year.

The campaign with other conservation bodies to oppose the Reviva Recycling application for change to a storage site for building materials met with partial success, as Reviva had to modify their plan with much improvement for local residents of Elstree village.

Our main concerns have been the future of Aldenham Reservoir and Woodcock Hill Village Green.

Elstree and Borehamwood have two wonderful assets, the film and television studios and Aldenham Reservoir.

The owners, Liberty Lake Leisure, have now lowered the water level in the reservoir exposing acres of stinking mud, despite engineering reports that the dam is in satisfactory condition, and have fenced off the water blocking part of the footpath.

Together with Aldenham Country Park Trust, E&B Residents' Association, Radlett Village Society and Aldenham Parish Council we have campaigned for full public access and restoration of the water level with an appeal on Change.org to "Restore Full Public Access

to Aldenham Reservoir". Approaching 1,500 have signed so far. We marched with EBRA to demonstrate support for their campaign.

We have fully backed the fight by Woodcock Hill Village Green Society to prevent housing on this historic and valued green space which has had Village Green Status since 2008.

The proposed building of 330 houses along Allum Lane and 830 on Radlett Golf Club has been vigorously opposed on grounds of loss of Green Belt and wildlife habitat, confluence of settlements and

the inevitable massive traffic congestion which would be caused with associated air pollution. We support ALFA, the local residents' group, in their resistance to these areas being included in the new Hertsmere Local Plan due next Spring.

Please, if you care for our environment, join the Green Belt Society and sign the petition on Change.org. We need every one to add weight to our campaigns!

Save Aldenham Reservoir

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society are appealing to the public to support their campaign to restore the water level and circular path for all.

Aldenham dam and reservoir is a beautiful, treasured local asset, part of our national heritage and a green space providing leisure, walks and contact with nature for families from north west London and south west Herts. It provides habitats for bats, other creatures and waterfowl. The adjacent Aldenham Country Park benefits from the view and the lakeside walk.

Originally common land, it was commandeered by Lord Aldenham and sold to the canal company as a water supply for the 18th century Grand Union Canal. It was dug out by French prisoners of war who constructed the clay dam in 1795. In the 19th century it became a place for swimming, boating and leisure as period photos in our museum attest. Charles Dickens, no less, is known to have rowed on it.

Sold by British Waterways to private owners, it was leased to Hertfordshire County Council until 2015.

At this point the owners, Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd, applied for planning permission for 150 houses on land on the opposite side of Watford Road. If they were allowed to build on low value Green Belt with no public access, Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd promised to make a donation of 4.5 million pounds to fund a community interest company to run the reservoir and repair the dam, which is subject to regular movement. This scheme, which had Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society's backing, was refused by Hertsmere planners as was a later plan for a 'Nature Retreat' of 50 weekend pods occupying a third of the periphery of the reservoir. This was opposed by all local conservation bodies.

Now Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd have lowered the water level by two metres^o despite engineers' reports stating that the dam was in satisfactory condition, causing closure of Aldenham Sailing Club and revealing acres of stinking mud. The owners have partially fenced off the water with two metre metal fencing which has spoilt the view and blocked a section of the footpath currently the subject of an application for designation as a public Right of Way.




New president

Victor has chosen MIND as his charity of his year as president of Rotary. The mental health issues related to lockdown and the pandemic are especially hard for people with depression.


Club members gathered and had lunch for the occasion all keeping to the social distance guidelines and had a very happy afternoon.
